

Wouter Veening (1942, political science, economics and social psychology University of Amsterdam) is co-founder and currently Chairman and President of the Institute for Environmental Security (2002), headquartered in The Hague, opposite the Peace Palace. His previous professional positions were policy advisor at the Dutch ministry of the environment and policy director at the Netherlands Committee for IUCN (International Union of the Conservation of Nature) during which he actively participated in the environmental policy dialogue with the World Bank, the IMF, the Global Environment Facility, the European Union. Tropical rainforests, especially those of the Amazon and of Indonesia, were and are a main focus of his work. As President of IES his work is oriented towards environmental risk situations that may trigger conflicts if not addressed timely and effectively. Because of its location in The Hague, Legal Capital of the World, IES attaches great importance to the role of international law in preventing environmental risks and conflicts. Through its Brussels office, IES is involved in 'greening' the EU Common Foreign and Security Policy and the associated security communities, in monitoring the compliance and enforcement of international environmental law using the data of the European Space Agency, and in improving the EU trade regime concerning illegally and unsustainably produced commodities.
